Foreword

It gives me great pleasure to introduce the annual report of the Saudi Fund for Development (SFD) on behalf of SFD's Board of Directors (BOD) for the fiscal year (2020). It covers various developmental sectors during the fiscal year (2020). This report is issued given the tough socio-economic challenges facing the whole world in the wake of COVID - 19 Pandemic that touched most parts of the world since early (2020). Such pandemic left behind a death toll surpassing one and half million; thus, countries are forced to take urgent and drastic measures against the pandemic. Such measures have affected economic activities within both public and private sectors, leading to a major glitch in international trade and supply chains. Consequently, this has affected energy markets, currencies, commodities, consumables, production material and global inter-state travel. Such glitch also sent out echoes of aggravation of debt crisis, fluctuation of capital markets and energy prices, and countries' losses from natural disasters sustained due to drought spells and floods. The aforementioned factors, as a whole, had an adverse effect on gains made in international development over the past term.

As a member of the International Development Association and one of KSA's institutions involved in provision, management and follow-up of external development assistance, SFD has kept fulfilling its mission and promoting the KSA's role in lending developing brotherly and friendly countries a helping hand with regard to mitigating its development dilemmas, in the more impoverished countries in particular. In its efforts to support the development process in the developing countries in (2020), SFD contributed to financing 16 development projects and programs in 12 developing countries with a total amount exceeding SR. 1228 million. SFD has, since its inception up to date, signed 730 loan agreements to finance development projects and programs in 84 countries and one international institution in Africa, Asia and other regions of the world with a total amount exceeding SR. 69095 million.

Within SFD's role in supporting the economic relations between KSA and other countries and enhancing its contributions to local content development, SFD during this fiscal year approved 5 national non-oil export financing transactions with a total value of. SR 510 million. Thus, the number of national non-oil export financing transactions approved by SFD, since the inception of this program activity in (2001) to this year, reached 298 transactions with a total value of SR. 81951 million. With regard to national export guarantee activities, the total number of policies issued by the program since its inception until the end of (2020) amounted to 325 national export guarantee policies with a total value of SR. 37580 million.

The figures and statistics included in this report underline the attention and interest of the government of the Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques and His Royal Highness the Crown Prince – May Allah protect them - to support development efforts in the developing countries and to strengthen the Kingdom's economic relations with brotherly and friendly countries. They also reflect SFD's role and ongoing achievement of its set objectives.

Saudi Fund for Development (SFD) in Brief



Foundation:

SFD was founded by virtue of Royal Decree No. M/48, issued on 14/8/1394, corresponding to 01/09/1974, and it commenced operations on 18/2/1395, corresponding to 01/03/1975.



Objectives:

As defined in its charter, SFD's main objectives are to participate in financing development projects in the developing countries by granting them the necessary loans, and the necessary technical assistance for financing studies and institutional support, and financing and guaranteeing the national non-crude oil exports.



Management and Organization:

SFD is a general institution and legal entity of an independent financial status. It is managed by a ten-member BOD. SFD's CEO assumes the executive authority and he is responsible for the implementation of the BOD's decisions.

Capital:

SFD has commenced its activity with a capital of ten thousand million Saudi Riyals provided by the Saudi government. This capital had then been increased over three phases to reach thirty-one thousand million Saudi Riyals.



SFD contributes to such projects by providing soft loans. Its activity is not geographically restricted, and it also deals directly with the governments of the developing countries in order to participate in financing priority development projects. SFD



First: Development Loans for Financing Development Projects

The Following conditions have to be met to obtain SFD's loan:

- A. The project to be financed in the recipient country should be proved economically or socially feasible.
- B. The funding of the entire project for which the loan is provided should be available.
- C. The loan should be disbursed and repaid in Saudi Riyal.
- D. The loan amount granted to any project should neither exceed 5% of SFD's capital.
- E. The total loan amounts granted to any country in one time should neither exceed 10% of SFD's capital.

Second: Export Credit and Insurance

For financing and insuring exports, SFD takes into consideration the following conditions:

A. The eligible national commodities and services as well as the added value should

as follows:

- 1. Industrially processed products, including the petroleum sector by-products, industrial and agricultural goods, and the exported services and turnkey projects.
- 2. The local added value to the commodities and services to be exported should be equivalent to, but not less than, 25%.
- B. Coverage Percentage and Finance Term:
- 1. SFD's financing percentage may reach up to 100% of the export transaction value according to the kind of exports, nature of transaction and the commercial and political risks involved.
- 2. The financing terms vary from one to twelve years.
- 3. The coverage percentage of the exports guarantee and insurance service is 90% of the total unpaid value of the exports.
- C. The Accepted Currency:
 - The Saudi Riyal or US Dollar is approved as the official currency for all Program's transactions
- D. The Required Guarantees for Finance:

The Program fulfills the needed guarantees to secure SFD's rights based on the nature of transaction, its risks and the legal entity of its involved parties.




Chapter One:

Development Activities during the Fiscal Year (2020)



1. Signed Loans Agreements

In continuation of SFD's efforts to support development projects in developing countries to enhance the international development process, SFD signed 16 loan agreements during the fiscal year (2020) with 12 developing countries, with a total value of SR. 1228 million, in order to contribute to financing 16 development projects and programs. Of these, 9 development projects and programs are in the African continent with a total value of SR. 659.62 Million, including one additional loan, and 7 development projects and programs are in the Asian continent with a total value of SR. 568.38 million, and this is evident in the following drawing.






2. Sectorial Distribution of Signed Loans Agreements

During (2020), SFD continued its activity in supporting development projects in a number of economic and social sectors of high priority in the development plans and programs in a number of developing countries in Africa, and Asia. Transport, communications, social infrastructure sectors have received the largest share in terms of the number of projects, where SFD financed 5 development projects for each at a total value of SR. 295.13 million and SR. 257.87 million respectively, representing 24.03% and 21% of the total amount respectively. They are then followed by the manufacturing sector with 4 financed projects, at a total value of SR. 375 million, representing 30.54% of the total amount. In addition, SFD financed 2 projects for energy sector at a total value of SR. 300 million, representing 24.43% of the total loans of this year.



3. Signed Projects





Burkina Faso

Project Description and Objectives

Such project aims to contribute to socio-economic development through supporting the country's road network integration, upgrading the level of roads' safety and reducing the costs of transportation and travel time. The Project will also contribute to serving the agricultural development efforts in the Project area, in addition to creating jobs and facilitating access to education and health services for the inhabitants. The project consists of works to attain a resurfaced and asphalted road with a length of about 94 km, in addition to works to attain resurfaced and asphalted roads within Ouahigouya with a length of about 10 km, paving about 20 km of earth rural roads, with a total 124 km-long roads are paved.





Burkina Faso

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to accelerate economic growth, improve the food security by developing and ensuring 2000 ha of the fertile land, diversify and boost agricultural production, promote marketing of products, encourage animal husbandry, fish farming and fruit growing, build supporting infrastructures and create jobs for women and youth in particular. The number of beneficiaries of this project is expected to be 360 thousand inhabitants. In addition, 2000 ha of cultivated lands will be developed and mobilized in Suno Kori along Mohan and Sourou rivers. The project is based on the concept of integrated development, where it consists of some elements to train beneficiaries on modern irrigation techniques and advanced production modalities. Some schools will also be subject to rehabilitation. In addition, it will make healthcare more accessible inhabitants for through transforming one medical clinic to a medical center and building a new medical clinic in the project's area.






Benin

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to contribute to achieving the seventh sustainable development goal through covering shortfalls in electric power generation and enhancing transmission network and electricity distribution in eight provinces within the Republic of Benin. This is intended to promote and develop sustainable and safe access to electricity with regard to all domestic, commercial and industrial uses in accordance with environmental and social safety standards across the country.





Tanzania

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims at rehabilitation and expansion of Mnazi Mmoja Hospital -Zanzibar Island to provide citizens with the proper healthcare and specialized health services that are not available in the island. Accordingly, it is intended to control the outbreak of diseases. epidemics and death toll, to shorten waiting times and to reduce costs incurred by citizens to travel abroad for project involves treatment. The rehabilitation and expansion of Mnazi Mmoja Hospital's three buildings on a 14000 m2 area, construction of new units on a 7500 m2 area, construction of water supply systems, sewerage and rainwater drainage systems, electrical connections, and internal roads and reconstruction of water-treatment plant and green areas. It also aims to provide medical supplies, medical and non-medical furniture and electromechanical equipment.






Tanzania

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to develop rural roads network within Mnemba Island - Zanzibar. with purpose of easing challenges regarding relocation of the island's inhabitants, reducing transport costs of agricultural and other commodities; thus broadening socio-economic development support within the island. The project further takes part in improving the standard of living of inhabitants, within the framework of Zanzibar's Poverty Reduction plan, making social services centers more accessible, and revitalizing tourism within the island. The project also involves construction and rehabilitation of whity-shaky road with a length of 22.4 km.





Gambia

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to complete additional construction works and supply Banjul International Airport Project with state-of-the-art furniture, supplies and equipment through rehabilitation of service roads within the Airport, including roads surrounding terminals, completing indoor and outdoor terminal works and supplying all required equipment and devices, along with baggage scanners and safety and control systems. The project further involves digging a water well, equipping it with the necessary pumps, building a tank, replacing pipelines that link the water system with the Airport.






Djibouti

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to meet the increasing demand for electricity power in the city of Djibouti through the construction of a new 50 MW power plant in Damerjog, that will use natural gas and heavy fuel oil, as well as the expansion of the 230 KV and 63 KV electricity transmission network through development of two new substations, expansion and development of two existing substations, construction of overhead lines and laying of underground cables.





Union of the Comoros

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to support urbanization in the Union of the Comoros through building and equipping Dar Al Ifta and Sharia Court premises. Dar Al Ifta consists of a ground floor and two other floors, where each floor area is a 510 m2, with a total area of 1530 m2. Court of Sharia premises consist of a ground floor and two other floors, where each floor area is a 200 m2, with a total area of 600 m2.





Madagascar

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to develop the Transport and Communication sectors within Republic of Madagascar through building a bridge with a length of 880 m and linking it with the National Road 9. In addition, approach roads, with a total length of about 7 kilometers, will be constructed to link the bridge with the National Road 9. Another bridge, with a length of 60m, will also be built. The project also involves developing two marketplaces, digging 6 wells equipped with pumps and building a primary healthcare center and a school.





Uzbekistan

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to support education sector in the Republic of Uzbekistan through constructing and rebuilding 40 kindergartens with a totally capacity of 4500 female and male students. It is further intended to provide the same sector with logistic services in terms of supplying the required equipment and furniture.





Iraq

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to support agricultural sector within the Republic of Iraq through construction of a metal silo for grain storage with a 60-thousand-ton capacity and a handling capacity of 300 ton/hour, using state-of-the-art electro-mechanical equipment and supporting the project's demands in terms of civil, electrical, and mechanical works. This included construction of the technical unit building, information building and a waiting room for visitors and marketers, and a warehouse for spare parts, technical workshops and checkpoints. This also involved construction of a railway that links silos with the existing railway station of the governorate, in addition to providing such silos with the required equipment for operation, grain inventory management, control systems, and safety and fire-fighting supplies.





Iraq

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to reconstruction of a hospital with a capacity of 50 beds within a six-storey building on a total area of 4 thousand m2. The building comprises Emergency Rooms (ERs), outpatient clinics, maternity and child health clinics, intensive care units (ICUs), general surgery unit, orthopedic department and fracture care department. It also includes a two-storey building for physicians. The project further involves construction of a treatment terminal, oxygen lab, mortuary refrigerators and an incinerator. The project also provides medical supplies and consultancy services relevant to project design and oversight.





Vietnam

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to develop transport sector in the Republic of Vietnam and improve inter-district transportation means within Yen Bai through building an infrastructure network required for linking rural areas together so as to support economic development and rescue operations for poor municipalities in cases of natural disasters. The project also involves construction of 23 km long Khanh Hoa - Minh Chau road, in addition to construction of 29 km long Khanh Hoa- Van Yen road.






Kyrgyzstan

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to improve the living standards of the rural population and to increase economic returns through building 4 dams in Jeti-Oguz an Ton districts in Issyk-Kul region and Kochkor and Jumgal districts in Naryn region, where every dam has a capacity of 3.5. million m3. In addition, 125 km long concrete canals and irrigation canals are to be constructed to irrigate around 6000 ha of arable lands. This project also targets construction of a 65km long network to improve water supply.





Maldives

Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to enable 25 thousand of fishermen, farmers and their families to benefit from fish resources through providing necessary equipment for harvesting, storing and processing of fish, developing handling, sale and marketing system, to improve quality of agricultural products, to upgrade quality assurance systems and to develop mari-culture sector. This project will also promote the living standard of inhabitants and improve quality and safety of seafood.








Project Description and Objectives

The project aims to provide 2700 citizen with appropriate housing in favorable accommodation environment in Hulhumale Island through building 450 residential units and providing the area with all logistic services within the project's area.


Development Activities Up to End of the Fiscal Year (2020)



SFD Cumulative Contributions

Since its inception in (1975) until the end of (2020), the SFD had provided 730 development loans to finance 692 development projects and programs for the benefit of 84 developing countries worldwide. In addition, the SFD contributed to the signing of two financing agreements with the International Development Association (IDA), with a total amount of SR. 905.01 million, to bring the total amount provided by the SFD to SR. 69095.63 million, as illustrated in the following graph:

Geographical Distribution of Total Number and Amount of SFD Projects and Programs

The SFD's development policy focuses on geographically distributing its loans to the poorest and least developed countries. Based on this principle, the SFD devoted its developmental activity to Africa and Asia due to the low economic and developmental level, in addition to the increasing rates of population growth and unemployment and the reduced rates of income. Accordingly, the SFD contributed to the financing of 406 development projects and programs in 46 African countries with a total amount of SR. 39093.80 million. In addition, the

SFD contributed to the financing of 265 development projects and programs in 30 Asian countries with a total amount of SR. 27554.94 million. When it comes to Other Regions, the SFD contributed to the financing of 21 development projects and programs totaling SR. 1541.88 million, from which 8 countries around the world benefited, it is worth to mention that, the SFD signed two financing agreements with the International Development Association (IDA), for a total amount of SR. 905.01 million.





Sectorial Distribution of Total Number and Amount of SFD Projects and Programs

SFD seeks to provide the financing necessary for the development projects in the developing countries. Its primary focus is placed on the sectors of infrastructure and productivity. Since the Fund began its loan activities in the mid-seventies to the end of (2020), the number of development projects and programs financed in the transport and communication sector reached 226. The social infrastructure came in the second place with 223 development

projects and programs. The agriculture sector came in next place with 97 projects and programs, followed by the energy sector with 76 projects and programs. In the same way, the Fund contributed to the financing of 54 projects and programs in other sectors. The Fund financed 16 projects and programs in the industry and mining sector, as well as executing two financing agreements with international organizations.

Sectorial and Geographical Distribution of Total Number and Amount of Projects and Programs

Since its loan activities and until the end of (2020), the SFD has contributed to finance 692 development projects and programs in various infrastructure sectors specified within the framework of its development activity in Africa, Asia and Other Regions worldwide. The projects and programs covered transportation, communications, agriculture, energy, social infrastructure, industry, mining and other

sectors, including 406 development projects and programs in Africa with a total amount of SR. 39093.80 million, 265 in Asia with a total amount of SR. 27554.94 million, and 21 in Other Regions worldwide with a total amount of SR. 1541.88 million. The SFD also contributed to the signing of two financing agreements with international organizations with a total amount of SR. 905.01 million.

In light of its belief in the importance of supporting projects in the social infrastructure sectors in the developing countries, owing to its role in developing human resource, in addition to increasing efficiency, productivity, improvement of living condition and health of the population, the social infrastructure has topped the list of the sectors financed by the SFD in terms of total loans amounts, which received an amount of SR. 20381.56 million, representing 29.49% of the total amount, to finance 223 development projects and programs, as illustrated in the following drawing.



Geographical Distribution of Total Number and Amount of Transportation and Communication Projects and Programs


In light of its belief in the importance of the transportation and communication sector in the economy of the developing countries, the SFD perceived the key role, which this sector plays as it links urban areas with rural areas and facilitating the movement of people and goods. The number of development projects and programs financed by the SFD in this sector totaled 226, with a total amount of SR. 19381.49 million representing 28.05% of the total amount, as illustrated in the following drawing.







Geographical Distribution of Total Number and Amount of Projects and Programs in Other Sectors

The SFD allocated part of its contributions to support the productive economic sectors represented in the agriculture, energy, industry and mining sectors as well as a number of other sectors and international organizations. Accordingly, the SFD financed 97 development projects and programs in the agricultural sector, 72 of which were in Africa, and 25 in Asia. The SFD financed 76 development projects and programs in the energy sector, 33 of which were in Africa, 42 in Asia and 1 in the other regions of the world. In the industry and mining sector, the SFD financed 16 development projects and programs, 10 of which in Africa and 6 in Asia. Other sectors received the financing necessary for the execution of 54 development projects and programs, with 33 in Africa, 18 in Asia and 3 in other regions worldwide. In addition, the SFD has executed two financing loan agreements with the international organization, with a total amount of SR. 905.01 million.








Cumulative Co-financing

Until the end of (2020), the total number of loans agreements accomplished within the framework of co-financing projects with other development institutions were 431 loan agreements from the total signed loans agreements - which totaled SR. 37537.69 million, representing 54.33% of the total amounts of the signed loans agreements.

Project in Focus

SFD's Efforts to Support Health Sector

The Health Sector is one of the most significant developmental sectors around the world. It represents a vital factor in the determination of the economic performance of the countries and one of the economic and social factors for stability. The main function of the sector is to provide comprehensive and high-quality health services, in addition to its positive effects on the performance of the other sectors, of which the national economy is composed, through directly or indirectly providing work opportunities. Furthermore, the Health Sector decreases the possibility of social exclusion on the local level through affecting the employment, work conditions and family's income.

The provision of the healthcare services is one of the cornerstones in the development plans and programs of all developed and developing countries around the world. Such services contributes, with other economic sectors, to developing the national income. Thus, such services play a main role in raising the standards of living. The significance of such role played by the economic development process is increased specifically in the developing countries, where such process requires a healthy generation to participate in its raise and development.

The improvement of health systems in the developing countries contributes to achievement of the sustainable development goals through analyzing and understanding its development, economic and social effects. It also contributes to the spread of health culture through working with new partners and local institutions that have the ability to demonstrate the impact of the health systems in the local and national economies and the advantages of the proprietary

rights. Moreover, it pushes the wheel of the comprehensive growth, then, creates opportunities to the whole society, especially those late ones and improves the impact on the local level through studies options in the employment and purchase for support of communities and treatment of health equality on the local level.

The increasing population growth in the developing countries, the constant change in the epidemics spread and the emergence of the new types of abnormal diseases are among factors that cause pressure on the healthy systems, imposing the requirement to increase the health facilities and qualified medical personnel to meet the request of medical services.

In the beginning of (2020), the world witnessed a global health emergency and unprecedented economic crisis with the spread of Corona Virus (Covid-19). This pandemic has caused an economic crisis that leads to decrease in the GDP of the most of the developed or developing countries. The pandemic left behind large losses of lives, where more than of 130 million persons have been infected with the virus in all the countries, while more than 2 million persons have died of this virus. This pandemic has caused the increase of poverty and hunger, especially in developing countries, due to the suspension of production and supply chains, and the increase of unemployment due the halt of economic activities because of the global lockdown. However, by the end of (2020), signs of the crisis easement has emerged by the launching of a number of vaccines, which in turn will contribute to the mitigation of its impacts and returning life to its normal condition.

SFD has a prominent role in support of health sector in the developing countries throughout the development trip by establishing and

preparing hospitals and health centers and training their employees in recognition of the role assigned to SFD to improve the health of developing countries citizens to eliminate the pandemics and diseases in these countries. SFD has financed 65 health projects with an amount of SR. 5434.32 million, including 33 projects in Africa amounting to SR. 2846.21 million and 29 projects in Asia amounting to SR. 2346.23 million. Furthermore, SFD presented SR. 241.88 million to finance 3 health projects in other areas of the world. The following table shows the geographical distribution to the SFD contributions in this sector:

1. Support of Health Sector in Africa

The significance of health sector support in Africa has increased due to the circumstances facing African countries varies in difficulties across the continent. The governments of these countries face weakness of income returns, resulting in the weakness of spending rates on the development sectors, spread of poverty rates and raise of epidemic outbreak. The role of the SFD in the support of health sector in Africa appears through financing 33 projects in 21 countries. These projects have been implemented through 37 loans amounting to SR. 2846.21 million. Egypt, Zambia, Mauritius, Guinea and Tunisia are the countries that benefit most from the contributions of SFD. A set of selected projects in the health sector in Africa are provided as below:

1. Development of Al Kasr Al Aini Hospita in Egypt:

This project aims to provide a vision for the institutional development and raise the efficiency of Qasr El Eyni Hospital's infrastructure in order to improve the level of educational and training services provided in the Hospital. It further aims to provide healthcare services and to serve the society through changing the pattern of the public hospital to a specialization one, where the Hospital will be divided into three specialized departments. This will help to serve larger number of the patients with lower costs and improve the educational and training services to the students and medical personnel through development of programs based on the specialty. The capacity of the Hospital amounts to 3200 beds and the development of the Hospital will accelerate the clinical course to increase the capacity by 300%. The SFD has contributed to funding this project under a loan agreement of SR. 450 million.

2. The Construction of King Salman Bin Abdulaziz Specialized Hospital in Zambia:

This project aims to contribute to the provision of the healthcare proper to citizens in Zambia and provision of the specialized health services unavailable in the country. This, in turn, will contribute to reducing the waiting period to obtain the necessary healthcare services, reducing the deaths and contributing to the cancellation of costs incurred by the citizens to obtain treatment abroad. This can be executed through establishing specialized referral hospital in gynecology and pediatric with a capacity of 800 beds. This project includes provision of medical and non-medical equipment, development employee's abilities and health conditions, preparing specialized competencies in all medical and technical specialty to operate the hospital, and preparing the project implementation unit. The SFD contributed to funding this project by providing a loan of SR. 375 Million, equivalent to 98% of the project total costs.

3. Rehabilitation and Expansion of Donka Hospital in Conakry:

Through this project, SFD seeks to contribute to the development of the health services quality provided to generally the population of Guinea and particularly population of Conakry through rehabilitation and expansion of Donka Hospital and infrastructure in Conakry, and construction and equipment of new building with modern medical equipment and supply the necessary medical equipment and furniture. The project aims to increase the capacity of the Hospital and construct a building for the VIP with capacity of 30 beds and rooms for technical affairs. The SFD contributions in this project amounted to SR. 120 million.

4. Construction and Equipment of Two Hospitals (Class "B") in El Djem & Sabiba, Tunisia:

The project aims to develop the health sector in the Republic of Tunisia and provide the medical services to mitigate the burden of the large hospitals and receive the patients and emergencies quickly through the construction of two hospitals in El Djem and Sabiba at the downtown. The project is composed of the construction of building and electromechanical systems, and building and fitting the network of public services with the required equipment. Moreover, it is composed of the supply and mobilization of medical appliances and furniture and providing engineering, technical and advisory services and supervision of the implementation of this project. The contribution by SFD to this project amounted to SR. 150 million, equivalent to 86% of the project total cost.

5. Flacq Teaching Hospital Project in Mauritius:

This project includes construction of a multi-floors building of 94.520 m2 area, with capacity of 575 beds. It aims to provide high-quality services in the health region 3 in Mauritius pursuant to the government policies concerning the development of the hospital. The Hospital will include a medical center for education and a building for the specialized department with a capacity of 500 beds in addition to a floor for additional services such as radiation, ICU with a capacity of 75 beds and 10 operational departments and administrative offices. It further includes teaching building with a capacity of 100 students and another hall of 500 seats. The SFD contributed to funding this project by providing a loan of SR. 187.50 million.


6. Cancer Hospital Project in Mauritius:

The SFD has contributed to financing construction of a new building consists of 7 floors with total area of 17 thousand square meters, in addition to the rehabilitation of the current center of Cancer Hospital with capacity of 220 beds. This project is expected to serve more than 30,000 beneficiaries. This project includes mobilizing the building with all necessary electrical and mechanical fixtures and furniture and further includes the provision of all necessary medical equipment and appliances in addition to the provision of consultancy services and supervision of the project implementation. The SFD contributions in this project amounted to SR. 93.75 million.

2. Support of Health Sector in Asia:

The SFD contributes to support of various development project in Asia. Whereas Asia has wide area and population increase, it is necessary to cover the growing demand of the health sector projects by funding the health projects that provide the proper services and its impact will extend to farther population coverage. The SFD has contributed in support of health sector in Asia through funding 29 projects in 17 countries, including China, Jordan, Bangladesh, Lebanon, Sri Lanka and other Asian countries. These projects have been implemented under 33 loan agreements of SR. 2346.23 million. The following are some of the projects in Asia:

1. Construction and Equipment of Three Hospitals in Yanbian Prefecture in Jilin Province in China:

The project aims to support the social and economic development and provide the health services to Yanbian Prefecture in Jilin Province through construction and equipment of three hospitals (Yanbian No. 2, Yanbian Korean Medicine and Yanbian Children Hospital). This project will mitigate the suffering of population to obtain the developed health services. The capacity of admission departments in these hospitals reaches 820 beds, in addition to the outpatient departments of each hospital. The SFD contributions amounted to SR. 131.25 million for constructing these hospitals and supplying the necessary medical equipment.

2. Construction of Beirut Public Hospital in Lebanon:

The SFD has contributed to the funding of Beirut Public Hospital in the Republic of Lebanon with amount of SR. 129.85 million. The project

aims to meet the needs of medical advanced-level requirements of Beirut and its suburban population. This project is also devoted for the field of medical education, through construction of a hospital with capacity of 539 beds with accessories.

3. Construction of Hudaydah Central Hospital in Yemen:

This project aims to provide health services of various specialties to meet the increasing demand of the health services in Al Hudaydah and neighboring districts through construction of a central hospital with capacity of 370 beds provided for the services general, surgery and cardiac medicine, intensive care, day surgery unit and emergency departments. The SFD contributions amounted to SR. 112.50 million for financing this project.

4. Construction of Two University Hospitals in Sebelas Maret University and Andalas University in Indonesia:

This project aims to develop the health education to comply with the international standards and local needs and to establish a developed research center for the college of medicine. In addition, the project aims to construct two university hospitals of multiple floors with capacity of 270 beds. The project contributes to covering the increasing demand of the health sector in the project area. The project further includes provision and installation of medical equipment, completed fixture and medical education means and development of the infrastructure of all establishments. It also includes the development of educational programs, postgraduate studies and training. The project contributions amounted SR. 107.29 million for financing this project.


5. Construction and Expansion of Al-Bashir Government Hospital in Jordan:

The SFD has contributed to financing the project of Al-Bashir Government Hospital in Jordan through providing two loans with total amount of SR. 182.50 million. The project aims to keep up with the demand of the comprehensive healthcare to provide the health services for the citizens, through the expansion of Al-Bashir Government Hospital in Amman and construction of gynecological-obstetric hospital, building for internal medicine and surgery and building for services. In addition, the project includes equipment of the Hospital with furniture and equipment and rehabilitation of the old buildings.

3. Support of the Health Sector in Other Region:

The activity of SFD in financing the health sector projects extends to other countries around the world. Such countries seek to enhance and develop their own health sectors through construction, updating and rehabilitation of the health establishment in order to fulfill the increasing demand of the medical services in such countries. The SFD has played a significant role in support of the health sector in other countries through the support of two projects in Bosnia and Herzegovina and one project in the Republic of Cuba. These projects are implemented through signing 3 loan agreements with total amount of SR. 241.88 million. The projects of health sector in other countries are as follows:

1. Construction and Equipment of a Number of Hospitals in Bosnia and Herzegovina:

The project aims to provide the developed medical services to the largest number of population in Herzegovina Region through completion of construction and rehabilitation of 3 medical establishments located in Mostar and Konjic. The project consists of the construction of the regional general hospital, rehabilitation of the old building, completion and rehabilitation of Konjic Hospital, construction of pediatric clinic in the university hospital in Mostar, construction and equipment of a number of departments and provision of the necessary medical equipment in these hospitals. The SFD contributions in this project amounted to SR. 73.13 million.

Herzegovina:

The SFD contributed to financing this project that aims to provide the developed medical services to the largest number of population in Bosnia and Herzegovina through the completion and construction of 4 medical establishments located in Sarajevo, Mostar and Konjic. The project consists of a regional medical center and community in Mostar, the expansion and equipment of the general hospital in Konjic and the medical community of University of Sarajevo. The SFD contributions in this project amounted to SR. 93.75 million.


3. Rehabilitation and Equipment of a Number of Maternity Hospitals in Cuba:

The project aims to develop the health services in maternity field and provide the same to various areas in Cuba, through rehabilitation and provision of medical equipment, supplies and furniture to a number of maternity hospitals affected by the hurricane of 2008. In addition, the project aims to cover the needs of the neighboring areas. Therefore, the SFD contributions in this project amounted to SR. 75 million.

Chapter Three:

SFD's Activity in Financing and Guaranteeing National Exports (SEP)



Saudi Exports Program (SEP) Activities in 2020

The Saudi Exports Program (SEP) of the SFD aims to contribute to diversification of national income resources through providing facilities of financing and guarantee to develop the Saudi non-crude oil exports. Since its inception in the fiscal year (2001), SEP offered financing and guarantee services for Saudi exporters and importers of Saudi goods and services from abroad.



First: Financing Exports

A. Financing Approved Exports

The service of financing exports aims to provide the required finance to the exporters and importers of the national goods of Saudi origin. SEP has received a set of financing demands for export transactions of national goods in (2020). SFD has approved financing 5 export transactions for non-oil goods amounting to SR. 510 million. The approved transactions during this year included exportation of national goods and services to Sri Lanka, Ghana, Azerbaijan, Iraq and other countries. Thus, the transactions of financing national non-oil exports approved by SFD have been raised since the commencement of the SEP to 298 transactions with a total value of SR. 81951 million.

B. Agreements of Financing Signed Export

Within the fiscal year of (2020), SFD has signed 4 agreements of the financing of exports transactions; three for the importers of Mauritius, Sri Lanka and Turkmenistan with total value of SR. 1578.75 million. Furthermore, a LOC agreement was signed with a bank operating in Mauritania with a total value of SR. 11.25 million. Thus, the total value of the signed agreements during (2020) reached SR. 1590 million.



Second: Guarantee Activity

Guarantee service aims to provide the necessary insurance of exporters and importers of the national goods of Saudi origin. The SEP has received a set of guarantee demands of the export transactions during (2020). The SFD approved 10 guarantee transactions of comprehensive insurance policies to export non-crude oil with total value of SR. 3418 million. Furthermore, the SFD approved 5 guarantee documents to enhance letters of credit through partnership with Saudi banks to export non-crude oil with total amounts of SR. 228.70 million.




